Differentiation and supports

Support area	This week's plan
Special education / IEP	Reduce group size; pair visual cue cards with all verbal directions; allow gesture or picture response in place of speech; pre-teach the week's target in a 1:1 warm-up.
Section 504	Provide the child's documented accommodations throughout; permit movement breaks and alternative seating at any point in the sequence.
Multilingual learners	Introduce each vocabulary word with an object or image; accept home-language responses; send the vocabulary list home where a translation is available; pair with a peer who shares the home language.
Advanced / extension	Ask the learner to teach the skill to a peer, extend the task, or record a demonstration for the class reference wall.

Support area	This week's plan
Intervention / reteach	Reteach the target in a short small group using the same materials; split the day's check for understanding into two smaller steps.
Enrichment	Extend into an open-ended centre or project connected to the essential question.

Assessment and evidence

Child states an intention and selects matching materials.

Family communication

Ask what the child plans to make before they start.

The document states its own edition as "January 2020, updated from original 2007 version"; the department's early learning landing page is <https://education.alaska.gov/earlylearning>. IT IS A GUIDELINES DOCUMENT RATHER THAN A COURSE OF STUDY, and it is organised by DEVELOPMENTAL DOMAIN rather than by school subject: five domains carry FIFTY-TWO NUMBERED GOALS running continuously from 1 to 52 across the whole document, so a goal number identifies a goal uniquely without needing its domain. Each goal is then printed FOUR TIMES OVER, once for each age band -- infants birth to 9 months, older infants, toddlers 18 to 36 months, and preschoolers 36 to 60+ months -- with the same goal statement each time and different indicators under it. THE GOAL STATEMENT IS WHAT IS REGISTERED. The indicator bullets under each goal are printed in two facing columns headed "PRESCHOOLERS MAY" and "YOU CAN", the first being things a child may do and the second being strategies for the adult; NEITHER IS A STANDARD, the two columns interleave unreliably when the PDF is read as text, and neither is registered. THIS ENTRY IS DOMAIN 4, GENERAL KNOWLEDGE AND COGNITION, AT THE PRESCHOOLER BAND. Alaska publishes NO SEPARATE ARTS DOMAIN at preschool age and TWO GOALS IN TOTAL for the whole of the creative arts: goal 46, using creative arts to express and represent what children know think believe or feel, and goal 47, understanding and appreciating creative arts. THAT IS TWO GOALS ACROSS VISUAL ART, MUSIC, DANCE AND DRAMA, and a buyer should know it before paying: the plan teaches all four art forms across thirty-six weeks, but Alaska does not publish a separate standard for each, so the eight teaching strands map onto those two goals. NO ARTIST, ARTWORK, SONG, DANCE, PLAY OR CULTURE IS NAMED BY THE STANDARDS AND NONE IS NAMED BY THIS PLAN.
