Differentiation and supports

Support area	This week's plan
Special education / IEP	Reduce group size; pair visual cue cards with all verbal directions; allow gesture or picture response in place of speech; pre-teach the week's target in a 1:1 warm-up.
Section 504	Provide the child's documented accommodations throughout; permit movement breaks and alternative seating at any point in the sequence.
Multilingual learners	Introduce each vocabulary word with an object or image; accept home-language responses; send the vocabulary list home where a translation is available; pair with a peer who shares the home language.

Support area	This week's plan
Advanced / extension	Ask the learner to teach the skill to a peer, extend the task, or record a demonstration for the class reference wall.
Intervention / reteach	Reteach the target in a short small group using the same materials; split the day's check for understanding into two smaller steps.
Enrichment	Extend into an open-ended centre or project connected to the essential question.

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Source citation

Montana Office of Public Instruction. Montana K-12 World Languages Content Standards (adopted 2024, implemented 2026). Codes and statements are transcribed from the MONTANA K-12 WORLD LANGUAGES CONTENT STANDARDS, whose first page reads "Adopted 2024. Implemented July 1, 2026". THAT DATE MATTERS: this edition superseded the 1999 Montana world languages standards on 1 July 2026, so it is the framework in force for the 2026-27 school year and the 1999 standards are no longer the ones to cite. The document sets out its own coding scheme as MT, content area, standard number and sub-standard letter, giving MT.WL.1 to MT.WL.5 for the five goal areas -- Communication, Cultures, Connections, Comparisons and Communities -- with lettered sub-standards beneath them. THE FRAMEWORK IS NOT ORGANISED BY GRADE. It is a single K-12 proficiency framework, so the same fifteen standards apply at every grade and what changes is the proficiency expected. Grade and level differentiation lives in the document's PERFORMANCE DESCRIPTORS, coded MT.WL.PD.*; the document states that these "are not standards but are coded for ease of reference", and they are deliberately NOT registered, since presenting a reference aid as a state requirement would misrepresent what a school is accountable to. MONTANA INDIAN EDUCATION FOR ALL CONTENT IS WRITTEN INTO THE STANDARDS THEMSELVES, requiring reflection on the cultures of Montana Indigenous Tribes, acquisition of perspectives including Montana Tribes, and comparison with Montana Indigenous Languages; those words are part of the standards and are transcribed with them. The document's cover misspells its own publisher as "MONTANA OFFICE OF PUBLIC INSTUCTION"; the agency name is recorded correctly here. THIS ENTRY REGISTERS ALL FIFTEEN CODES of the Montana K-12 World Languages Content Standards: the five standards MT.WL.1 to MT.WL.5 and their ten lettered sub-standards. THE DOCUMENT DOES NOT PUBLISH GRADE-BY-GRADE STANDARDS. It defines PROFICIENCY RANGES for a K-8 programme, so which range a class is in depends on how long its students have been learning the language rather than on their age, and a grade 3 product cannot honestly claim a "grade 3

standard" that the state does not print. This year is built across the NOVICE HIGH and INTERMEDIATE LOW ranges, one step on from the grade 2 year, which is where a third or fourth year of study normally sits; the planner says so plainly so a buyer whose programme is further ahead or behind can tell before buying. THE STANDARDS ARE WRITTEN FOR "THE TARGET LANGUAGE" WITHOUT NAMING ONE, and this planner is too: no language, and no specific culture, country, festival, landmark, song or folktale, is prescribed anywhere, so a Spanish, French, German, Mandarin, Latin or ASL programme all use it as written. MT.WL.3 requires acquiring information and diverse perspectives INCLUDING MONTANA AMERICAN INDIAN PERSPECTIVES, and that wording is part of the standard. THE EDITION MATTERS: these standards were adopted in 2024 with implementation in 2026, so they are the ones in force for the school year this planner is sold into.

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
