Measurable objectives

- Students will apply properties of operations to add, subtract, factor and expand linear expressions with rational coefficients.
- Students will check equivalence after each manipulation.

Success criteria (student-friendly)

- "I collect only like terms."
- "I factor out a common factor."
- "I check by substituting."

Differentiation and supports

Support area	This week's plan
Special education / IEP	Reduce group size; pair visual cue cards with all verbal directions; allow gesture or picture response in place of speech; pre-teach the week's target in a 1:1 warm-up.
Section 504	Provide the child's documented accommodations throughout; permit movement breaks and alternative seating at any point in the sequence.
Multilingual learners	Introduce each vocabulary word with an object or image; accept home-language responses; send the vocabulary list home where a translation is available; pair with a peer who shares the home language.
Advanced / extension	Ask the learner to teach the skill to a peer, extend the task, or record a demonstration for the class reference wall.

Support area	This week's plan
Intervention / reteach	Reteach the target in a short small group using the same materials; split the day's check for understanding into two smaller steps.
Enrichment	Extend into an open-ended centre or project connected to the essential question.

Assessment and evidence

Expressions added, factored and expanded, with equivalence checked.

Family communication

Ask your child how they checked two expressions were the same.

Focus	The foundation.
Learning target	"I can add, factor and expand linear expressions and check they still mean the same."
Vocabulary in use	linear expression, term, coefficient, like terms, factor, expand, equivalent

Learning sequence

Connect: Grade 6's expressions. Teach: terms, coefficients and why only like terms combine - with tiles so unlike terms are physically different objects. Try: shared sorting. Apply: pupils collect terms in four expressions. Reflect: collecting unlike terms is the error, and it comes from treating a letter as a label rather than a number.

Check for understanding

Student collects like terms correctly and explains why others cannot combine.

is dysregulated	Pause instruction, move to co-regulation, and return to the target later.

Focus	The Grade 7 addition.
Learning target	"I can add, factor and expand linear expressions and check they still mean the same."
Vocabulary in use	linear expression, term, coefficient, like terms, factor, expand, equivalent

Learning sequence

Connect: like terms. Teach: the arithmetic of Weeks 5 and 6 now lives inside algebra - negative and fractional coefficients throughout. Try: shared practice. Apply: pupils add and subtract four such expressions. Reflect: this is the actual Grade 7 step up from Grade 6.

Check for understanding

Student adds expressions with rational coefficients.

Differentiation in the moment

If the learner...	Then...
needs more support	Model the step again with guided support, then fade to a gesture cue.
is ready for more	Invite the learner to demonstrate for a peer or add a second example.
is dysregulated	Pause instruction, move to co-regulation, and return to the target later.

Closure and reflection

Gather the group. Restate the learning target. Ask one learner to demonstrate. Name one specific thing the group did well, then preview tomorrow.

Focus	Distribution.
Learning target	"I can add, factor and expand linear expressions and check they still mean the same."
Vocabulary in use	linear expression, term, coefficient, like terms, factor, expand, equivalent

Learning sequence

Connect: coefficients. Teach: expanding a bracket including a negative multiplier, where the sign of every term inside changes - the commonest single error in the topic. Try: shared expansion. Apply: pupils expand six including negatives. Reflect: writing the multiplier against each term prevents it.

Check for understanding

Student expands a bracket with a negative multiplier correctly.

is ready for more	Invite the learner to demonstrate for a peer or add a second example.
is dysregulated	Pause instruction, move to co-regulation, and return to the target later.

Vocabulary in use	linear expression, term, coefficient, like terms, factor, expand, equivalent

Learning sequence

Connect: expanding. Teach: factoring as reversing the distribution, checked by expanding again - which makes it self-verifying. Try: shared practice. Apply: pupils factor four and check.

Check for understanding

Student factors an expression and verifies by expanding.

is ready for more	Invite the learner to demonstrate for a peer or add a second example.

Connect: the week. Teach: a mixed set, with equivalence checked by substituting a value. Try: shared setup. Apply: pupils complete. Reflect: this week's standard recorded.

Check for understanding

Student manipulates expressions and verifies equivalence.

needs more support	Model the step again with guided support, then fade to a gesture cue.
is ready for more	Invite the learner to demonstrate for a peer or add a second example.
is dysregulated	Pause instruction, move to co-regulation, and return to the target later.
