Measurable objectives

- Students will determine or clarify the meaning of unknown and multiple-meaning words and phrases, choosing flexibly from a range of strategies.
- Students will use context clues to determine meanings of unfamiliar spoken or written words.

- "I name several strategies."
- "I choose one that suits the word."
- "I check my answer makes sense."

Differentiation and supports

Support area	This week's plan
Special education / IEP	Reduce group size; pair visual cue cards with all verbal directions; allow gesture or picture response in place of speech; pre-teach the week's target in a 1:1 warm-up.
Section 504	Provide the child's documented accommodations throughout; permit movement breaks and alternative seating at any point in the sequence.
Multilingual learners	Introduce each vocabulary word with an object or image; accept home-language responses; send the vocabulary list home where a translation is available; pair with a peer who shares the home language.

Support area	This week's plan
Advanced / extension	Ask the learner to teach the skill to a peer, extend the task, or record a demonstration for the class reference wall.
Intervention / reteach	Reteach the target in a short small group using the same materials; split the day's check for understanding into two smaller steps.
Enrichment	Extend into an open-ended centre or project connected to the essential question.

Assessment and evidence

A strategy chosen and applied to an unknown word.

Family communication

Ask your child how they work out a new word.

Learning sequence

Connect: word parts from Unit 1. Teach: context, word parts, a dictionary, or asking - four routes, and the standard says CHOOSING FLEXIBLY FROM A RANGE. Try: shared listing. Apply: pupils name them. Reflect: YEAR-LONG SKILL context clues (context clues) taught here where it belongs.

Check for understanding

Student names several strategies for an unknown word.

Learning sequence

Connect: strategies. Teach: the sentence before and after often defines the word without saying so. Try: shared practice. Apply: pupils use context. Reflect: TEACHER SUPPLIES ALL TEXTS.

Check for understanding

Student infers a word's meaning from context.

needs more support	Model the step again with guided support, then fade to a gesture cue.
is ready for more	Invite the learner to demonstrate for a peer or add a second example.
is dysregulated	Pause instruction, move to co-regulation, and return to the target later.

Learning sequence

Connect: context. Teach: for a multiple-meaning word, context does not suggest the meaning - it SELECTS it. Try: shared practice. Apply: pupils select the right sense. Reflect: a genuinely different task from inferring an unknown word.

Check for understanding

Student selects the correct sense of a multiple-meaning word.

Differentiation in the moment

If the learner...	Then...
needs more support	Model the step again with guided support, then fade to a gesture cue.
is ready for more	Invite the learner to demonstrate for a peer or add a second example.
is dysregulated	Pause instruction, move to co-regulation, and return to the target later.

Closure and reflection

Gather the group. Restate the learning target. Ask one learner to demonstrate. Name one specific thing the group did well, then preview tomorrow.

Connect: our strategies. Teach: a technical term needs a dictionary; a made-up word needs context; a long word needs its parts. Try: shared matching. Apply: pupils choose. Reflect: FLEXIBLY is the standard's word and the assessed skill.

Check for understanding

Student chooses a strategy suited to a particular word.

Connect: choosing. Teach: putting the meaning back into the sentence to check. Try: shared checking. Apply: pupils verify. Reflect: the check that prevents a confident wrong answer.

Check for understanding

Student checks an inferred meaning against the sentence.

If the learner...	Then...
needs more support	Model the step again with guided support, then fade to a gesture cue.
is ready for more	Invite the learner to demonstrate for a peer or add a second example.
is dysregulated	Pause instruction, move to co-regulation, and return to the target later.

Closure and reflection
