Measurable objectives

- Students will analyze a text's explicit and implicit meanings to make inferences about its theme and determine the author's purpose.

Success criteria (student-friendly)

- "I distinguish explicit from implicit meaning."
- "My inferences are supported by the text."
- "I state a theme rather than a topic."

Differentiation and supports

Support area	This week's plan
Special education / IEP	Reduce group size; pair visual cue cards with all verbal directions; allow gesture or picture response in place of speech; pre-teach the week's target in a 1:1 warm-up.
Section 504	Provide the child's documented accommodations throughout; permit movement breaks and alternative seating at any point in the sequence.
Multilingual learners	Introduce each vocabulary word with an object or image; accept home-language responses; send the vocabulary list home where a translation is available; pair with a peer who shares the home language.
Advanced / extension	Ask the learner to teach the skill to a peer, extend the task, or record a demonstration for the class reference wall.
Intervention / reteach	Reteach the target in a short small group using the same materials; split the day's check for understanding into two smaller steps.
Enrichment	Extend into an open-ended centre or project connected to the essential question.

Assessment and evidence

A supported inference leading to a theme and an authorial purpose.

Family communication

Ask your child what a text meant that it never actually said.

Focus	The distinction.
Learning target	"I can move from what a text says to what it means and why it was written."

Learning sequence

Connect: Unit 2's techniques. Teach: explicit meaning as what the text states and implicit as what it commits itself to without stating - and that the second is inferred FROM the first rather than supplied by the reader's imagination. Try: shared sorting on a supplied passage. Apply: students list two explicit and two implicit meanings. Reflect: implicit is still in the text.

Check for understanding

Student distinguishes explicit from implicit meaning.

Day 42 — Inference With a Warrant

Focus	Discipline.

Learning sequence

Connect: implicit meaning. Teach: that an inference needs a warrant - the reason the evidence supports the conclusion - and that most weak literary claims fail at the warrant rather than at the evidence. Try: shared supplying of warrants for three inferences. Apply: students state an inference with its evidence and warrant. Reflect: the middle step is the one people skip.

Check for understanding

Student states an inference with evidence and warrant.

Differentiation in the moment

is ready for more	Invite the learner to demonstrate for a peer or add a second example.

Focus	Precision.

Learning sequence

Connect: inference. Teach: that a topic is what a text is about and a theme is what it says about it, so a theme is a sentence with a claim in it - and that one-word themes are topics wearing a disguise. Try: shared conversion of topics into themes. Apply: students state a theme for a supplied text as a full claim. Reflect: if it fits in one word, it is a topic.

Check for understanding

Student states a theme as a full claim.

Focus	The standard's second half.
Learning target	"I can move from what a text says to what it means and why it was written."
Vocabulary in use	explicit, implicit, inference, evidence, theme, topic, purpose, warrant

Learning sequence

Connect: theme. Teach: that purpose is what the text is FOR rather than what it means, that the two can diverge, and that purpose is inferred from choices - what is included, emphasised, addressed to whom. Try: shared inference of purpose. Apply: students state a purpose and the choices that evidence it. Reflect: meaning and purpose are different questions.

Check for understanding

Student infers an author's purpose from textual choices.

Focus	The honest case.

Learning sequence

Connect: theme and purpose. Teach: that competent readers reach different themes from the same text, that this is a property of literature rather than a failure, and that the test is the quality of the support rather than consensus. Try: shared comparison of two supported readings. Apply: students evaluate two readings by their support. Reflect: better supported, not more popular.

Check for understanding

Student evaluates competing readings by their support.
