Measurable objectives

- Students will use different bases of support to maintain momentary stillness.
- Students will hold a balance for a short count.

Success criteria (student-friendly)

- "I choose my base."
- "I hold still."
- "I count to three."

Differentiation and supports

Support area	This week's plan
Special education / IEP	Reduce group size; pair visual cue cards with all verbal directions; allow gesture or picture response in place of speech; pre-teach the week's target in a 1:1 warm-up.
Section 504	Provide the child's documented accommodations throughout; permit movement breaks and alternative seating at any point in the sequence.
Multilingual learners	Introduce each vocabulary word with an object or image; accept home-language responses; send the vocabulary list home where a translation is available; pair with a peer who shares the home language.
Advanced / extension	Ask the learner to teach the skill to a peer, extend the task, or record a demonstration for the class reference wall.

Support area	This week's plan
Intervention / reteach	Reteach the target in a short small group using the same materials; split the day's check for understanding into two smaller steps.
Enrichment	Extend into an open-ended centre or project connected to the essential question.

Assessment and evidence

Check: child holds a balance on a chosen base momentarily.

Family communication

See who can stand on one foot longest.

Warm-up: locomotor. Skill focus: teacher defines a base of support. Practice: children balance on two feet. Game: statue game. Cool-down: term introduced.

Check for understanding

Student holds a still balance on two feet.

needs more support	Model the step again with guided support, then fade to a gesture cue.
is ready for more	Invite the learner to demonstrate for a peer or add a second example.
is dysregulated	Pause instruction, move to co-regulation, and return to the target later.

Closure and reflection

Gather the group. Restate the learning target. Ask one learner to demonstrate. Name one specific thing the group did well, then preview tomorrow.

Fictional Example — Customize and Verify Before School Submission.

Most learners met the target. Two needed the visual cue repeated during guided practice; I will pre-teach with them tomorrow. The extension held attention longer than planned, so I shortened closure.

Warm-up: two-foot balance. Skill focus: teacher models one-foot balance. Practice: children try each foot. Game: one-foot statues. Cool-down: harder discussed.

Check for understanding

Student attempts a one-foot balance.

Warm-up: one-foot. Skill focus: teacher shows knee, seat, hand bases. Practice: children try. Game: base cards. Cool-down: bases charted.

Check for understanding

Student balances on a base other than their feet.

is ready for more	Invite the learner to demonstrate for a peer or add a second example.
is dysregulated	Pause instruction, move to co-regulation, and return to the target later.

Closure and reflection

Gather the group. Restate the learning target. Ask one learner to demonstrate. Name one specific thing the group did well, then preview tomorrow.

Warm-up: bases. Skill focus: teacher contrasts wide and narrow. Practice: children compare. Game: stability challenge. Cool-down: principle stated.

Check for understanding

Student states that a wider base is easier to balance on.

needs more support	Model the step again with guided support, then fade to a gesture cue.
is ready for more	Invite the learner to demonstrate for a peer or add a second example.
is dysregulated	Pause instruction, move to co-regulation, and return to the target later.

Closure and reflection

Gather the group. Restate the learning target. Ask one learner to demonstrate. Name one specific thing the group did well, then preview tomorrow.

is ready for more	Invite the learner to demonstrate for a peer or add a second example.
is dysregulated	Pause instruction, move to co-regulation, and return to the target later.

Gather the group. Restate the learning target. Ask one learner to demonstrate. Name one specific thing the group did well, then preview tomorrow.
